



CONFERENCE GUIDE

1. LEND US YOUR BRAIN

You are about to be hit by a blizzard of incoming ideas. Your mind will be zapped, pinged, prodded, and teased. But to benefit from TED's brand of brain therapy, you need to shut down the competition. Forget about work and school for a few hours. Forget about your email. Switch off your phone. Experience what is happening on stage, on screen and around you.

2. SEE EVERY TALK

The best moments seem to happen when you least expect them. TEDxTeen is not about what you already know. It is about how what you know connects to everything else.

3. TALK TO THE SPEAKERS

The conference time is limited, so we don't have time for long speaker introductions. We have included each speaker's bio in this program and relevant links to their work and additional information so you can take it all in after the conference. Attendees at TEDxTeen have the advantage – you can strike up a live conversation with them during the breaks. And we encourage you to do so! As you listen to their talks, write down questions, comments and ideas you want to talk about or ask them.

4. BREAKS ARE IMPORTANT

Your TEDxTeen experience is not limited to the auditorium. The TED brand is about "Ideas Worth Spreading." To get the most out of the conference, soak up the information during the talks and then use the breaks to discuss the information with fellow attendees, and let the conversation continue to push you to explore the ideas. Eat your food fast, use the bathroom quickly and keep your brain stimulated between sessions.

5. THE CONVERSATION CONTINUES

TEDxTeen is a one day conference. But today is not a finale - it is the beginning. The talks you saw today will live online following the conference at TEDxTeen.com and we encourage you to blog them, tweet them, share them, chat them and push them out around the globe. TEDxTeen is not just a conference, it is a community. Being here today you have first hand access and knowledge to amazing information and stories coming in from around the globe about teens who are doing extraordinary things, who have extraordinary ideas, who need your help to keep their conversations alive and who look to you for your ideas and contributions. Join in the community, contribute to the conversation and come together to tell the story of TEDxTeen to the world.

The Scholastic Auditorium is WiFi enabled and you will receive the network password at the conference. During the sessions please be courteous and remember to turn your iPhones, Blackberrys and cell phones off or to silent. Do not check them while speakers are on stage. If you must do so, please wait until the breaks. Video is prohibited during the sessions and breaks. Photography is permitted without flash but keep the clicking noises during sessions to a minimum. Following the conference we hope you will share your photos with our online community.

Amr is the founder and current president of Prevent @ashrafamr Air Pollution (PAP), an initiative tackling climate-related issues in Egypt through awareness and collective actions since August 2007. Amr founded PAP with the vision of establishing connections among the individuals, organizations and policymakers in Africa and the Middle East to solve the problem of air pollution and mitigate the effects of climate change on developing countries. Amr and his team were awarded first place in the climate change category at the 2007 Arab Environmental Youth Convention (AEYC) held in Bibliotheca Alexandrina, Egypt. Following this success, PAP carried out many awareness sessions as well as its famous "Training of Trainers on Climate Change" (TOTCC) where 40 Egyptian students were trained on soft skills and environmental history in order to promote awareness to the Egyptian community.

Amr is genuinely passionate about Information Technology, social media and computers in general and is studying Computer Science at the American University in Cairo (AUC). As a young Egyptian man who is addicted to social media, he witnessed and participated in the Egyptian Revolution, which started on January 25, 2011, and led to the ouster of Egypt's president, Hosni Mubarak. It was the first successful revolution in history to employ the use of the social media platforms.

Angwech Collines was born in northern Uganda during the height of the war. She expressed that during her childhood all she knew was this war, commuting nightly to sleep under street verandas in order to reduce the chance of being abducted and recruited into Joseph Kony's army of child soldiers.

She is currently traveling the U.S. with Invisible Children sharing her story and advocating on behalf of the people in DR Congo, Central African Republic and Sudan who are currently being terrorized by Joseph Kony's Lord's Resistance Army.

When she returns home she will be attending Gulu University on a scholarship from Invisible Children's Legacy Scholarship Program.

Angwech will pursue a degree in Development Studies in anticipation of working with the community and representing them in Parliament. Once she graduates, she will be among the 1% of women from northern Uganda who have completed university.

(Her astonishing verbal abilities already matched that of young adults more than twice her age.) Her breakthrough would soon come "in the form of a used Dell laptop her mother bought her." At age seven, she typed out over 250,000 words — poetry, short stories, observations about the world - in a single year.

Following the murder of her brother, Dan, a 22-year-old Reuters photojournalist, daneldon.com Amy changed her college major to Communications, determined to tell stories that would bring people together, not tear them apart. At 22, Amy hosted "Dying to Tell the Story," later nominated for an Emmy and distributed world-wide by CNN. Amy also coproduced "Soldiers of Peace," about the Children's Peace Movement in Colombia for CNN, and In 2003 co-created and hosted "Global Tribe," a PBS series about ordinary people finding solutions to the challenges they face in their local communities. Amy is the co-author of three books, published by Chronicle Books, "Soul Catcher: A Journal to Help You Become Who You Really Are," "Angel Catcher: A Journal of Loss and Rembrance" and "Love Catcher: A Journal to Invite Love into Your Life" and co-founder of Creative Visions Foundation, which supports "creative activists" who use media and the arts for social change. She is currently an Executive Producer of "Extraordinary Moms" a documentary special hosted by Julia Roberts for the new Oprah Winfrey Network (OWN). Amy, the mother of two children, is married to Director Jon Turteltaub and lives in Los Angeles.

Dave Eggers' first book, "A Heartbreaking Work of Staggering Genius," was a finalist for the Pulitzer 826national.org Prize. Since then he's written two more novels and launched an independent publishing house, which publishes books, a quarterly literary journal (McSweeney's), a DVD-based review of short films ("Wholpin"), a monthly magazine (The Believer) and the Voice of Witness project.

> Eggers has established himself as a philanthropist and teacher-at-large. In 1998 he launched 826 Valencia, a San Francisco-based writing and tutoring lab for young people, which has since opened six more chapters across the United States. He has extended his advocacy of students by supporting their educators, instituting a monthly grant for exceptional Bay Area teachers. His TED Prize wish is for more people to follow him into getting involved in your local school — and talk about it — through the website onceuponaschool.org.

Natalie and her five siblings had to survive on her mother's humble teacher salary, moving from city to city to find work. No stranger to adversity, Natalie was determined to make something great out of her life.

> At 17, Natalie saw the documentary "Invisible Children: The Rough Cut," a film exposing Africa's longest running war. Compelled by this story, she applied to be a volunteer, or "roadie," for "Invisible Children," using her voice to help end this war.

> She quickly stood out among the other interns, and was given the responsibility to help lead Invisible Children's largest project to date; an event in 100 cities worldwide called "The Rescue." Through her determination, tens of thousands of people came out to the event, sleeping in the streets for up to six days in order to raise the profile of this war.

Her efforts paid off when Oprah invited Invisible Children, and Natalie, onto her show to add her voice to the numbers. The event was then highlighted on "Larry King Live," CNN, and countless other news outlets. Natalie has natural charisma, astounding leadership qualities, and is now working in Los Angeles as a film editor, to continue to share stories of injustices.

In addition, his work has been featured in several gallery group shows including Mallick Williams & Co (2011 NYC), Leo Kesting (2010 NYC), This Gallery (2010 Los Angeles), Shadows Space (2009 Philadelphia) and Subliminal Projects (2008 Los Angeles).

Galvanized by sexism and poverty she encountered at 13, Tara founded Turn Your World Around, an organization that engages youth in making a global difference. The organization has since raised over \$100,000 and impacted and engaged people globally in various initiatives, garnering international awards and media attention.

Since arriving at Harvard in the fall of 2009, Tara has focused on learning and engaging critically with what it means to create "impact." To that end, she and her project teammates spent the past summer in a community of women forced into prostitution on the outskirts of New Delhi. She is currently working on a project that uses text messaging to facilitate accountability in the Indian education system. In her spare time, Tara enjoys reading, writing, baking cupcakes, and of late, making chocolate (definitely ask about her chocolate frogs).

During college, Niha has collaboratively spearheaded community development projects to empower female sex workers in India. She is currently helping to implement educational interventions in rural India that would allow more adolescent girls to attend school.

Niha has served on various national boards, including the America's Promise Alliance Youth Steering Committee and Nestlé Very Best in Youth Foundation Board. For her academic achievements and her commitment to public service, Niha has received awards from the Clinton Global Initiative, the Independence Bowl, Toyota, Prudential, Nestlé USA, and others.

William Kamkwamba, from Malawi, is a born inventor. When he was 14, he built an electricity-producing windmill from spare parts and scrap, working from rough plans he found in a library book called "Using Energy" and modifying them to fit his needs. The windmill he built powers four lights and two radios in his family home.

Kamkwamba's story is documented in his autobiography, "The Boy Who Harnessed the Wind: Creating Currents of Electricity and Hope." A short documentary about Kamkwamba, called "Moving Windmills," won several awards.

Jeremy Heimans is co-founder and CEO of Purpose.com, a social enterprise that builds movements to help solve major global problems. Jeremy has been building movements since he was a precocious little brat in his native Australia, running media campaigns and lobbying politicians from the age of eight on issues like environmental degradation and nuclear proliferation.

His voice has since broken but those global problems persist, so Jeremy co-founded Avaaz.org, the world's largest online political movement, and GetUp.org, the Australian political movement with more members than all Australia's political parties combined.

Jeremy now leads the team at Purpose, which has built movements to fight cancer with LIVESTRONG, to eliminate nuclear weapons with Global Zero, launched AllOut.org to promote LGBT rights around the world, and is working with Jamie Oliver on a national movement to transform our food culture.

Jeremy's career began with strategy consultants McKinsey and Company, he attended Harvard University and University of Sydney, and is a citizen of Australia and the Netherlands. The World Economic Forum at Davos has named Jeremy a 2011 Young Global Leader.

Zander Srodes, at age 11, created Turtle Talks — @Zander_Srodes an interactive sea turtle seminar for children. In 2004, he wrote a sea turtle activity book to promote conservation in coastal communities around the world. The book is available in six languages. He has authored two other children's activity books, one on the Gopher tortoise and one on freshwater turtles. There are over 250,000 books in print and all have been given away FREE.

> Zander travels the world promoting conservation. In 2010, he spoke at the International Youth Biodiversity Conference in Aichi, Japan and the 30th International Sea Turtle Symposium in Goa, India. He is currently lending support to efforts involving eco-tourism.

Zander, personally hosts groups of college students on two-week volunteer service trips to Costa Rica. There they work alongside local organizations and communities preserving Leatherback turtle nesting sites. He is an intern for SEE Turtles, and the Sea Turtle Conservancy, and a previous intern at Mote Marine Laboratory.

On Saturday mornings, he is a broadcaster on ESPN radio and talks about Florida sports.

TED is an annual event where some of the world's leading thinkers and doers are invited to share what they are most passionate about. "TED" stands for Technology, Entertainment, Design — three broad subject areas that are, collectively, shaping our future. And in fact, the event is broader still, showcasing ideas that matter in any discipline. Attendees have called it "the ultimate brain spa" and "a four-day journey into the future." The diverse audience — CEOs, scientists, creatives, philanthropists — is almost as extraordinary as the speakers, who have included Bill Clinton, Bill Gates, Jane Goodall, Frank Gehry, Paul Simon, Sir Richard Branson, Philippe Starck and Bono.

TED was first held in Monterey, California, in 1984. In 2001, Chris Anderson's Sapling Foundation acquired TED from its founder, Richard Saul Wurman. In recent years, TED has expanded to include an international conference, TEDGlobal; media initiatives, including TED Talks and TED.com; and the TED Prize.

About TEDx

In the spirit of ideas worth spreading, TEDx is a program of local, self-organized events that bring people together to share a TED-like experience. At a TEDx event, TEDTalks video and live speakers combine to spark deep discussion and connection in a small group. These local, self-organized events are branded TEDx, where x=independently organized TED event.

The TED Conference provides general guidance for the TEDx program, but individual TEDx events are self-organized.*


